14 | Programme Rationale & Aims

This programme offers a comprehensive overview of the main themes concerning the interrelationship between food, politics, and society. It combines theoretical coverage of key debates surrounding (among other issues) the origins of agricultural production, the sociology of consumption, food and the city, and the political ecology of our contemporary industrialised global food system, with more concrete explorations of the historical, sociological and political dimensions of (mal)nutrition, regulation of food markets, struggles and conflict over, and the cultural meanings of food. Though drawing from the field of Food Studies, the programme is self-consciously cross-disciplinary in its incorporation of political-theoretical, historical-sociological, cultural-anthropological and public policy literatures into the syllabus.

- Demonstrate skills of analysis and critique that can be transferred to further study in the social sciences and humanities

Learning, teaching and assessment methods

The programme uses the established teaching and assessment methods on the Politics MSc programmes, consisting of lectures and seminars for taught modules, along with a dissertation. Assessment on core taught modules will consist of EITHER an essay OR an open-book exam worth 90% of the final mark, and a 10% seminar participation mark.

18 | Programme Description

Students take four core modules – The Rise of the Modern Food System, The Politics of the Global Food System, the Political Sociology of the Modern State and Contemporary Political Sociology— and four options (all 15 credits), as well as writing a 60 credit dissertation. Full-time students take all eight taught modules in terms 1 to 3 and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept. Part-time students take two core modules and two options each year and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept of their second year.
